

- 1. The United Reformed Church Mission Council met on 15th, 16th and 17th March. Mission Council is a representative body of the United Reformed Church that meet to enable the decisions made at General Assembly so that the life and work of the United Reformed Church can be improved.
- 2. The East Midlands Synod Representatives were:

The Representatives met prior to the Mission Council Meeting to discuss the Mission Council and the papers for discussion.

RECIPE - APRIL: Pea & Watercress Soup (Serves 4)

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 medium onion, diced

300g of frozen peas

2 bags of watercress

1 - 1 and a half pints of chicken or vegetable stock Salt & pepper to season.

- 1) Fry the onion in the olive oil until soft.
- 2) Add the peas and stock, and simmer for 5 minutes. Skim off any foam that comes to the surface.
- 3) Add the watercress and blend with a hand-held blender.
- 4) Season to taste.

GARDENING TIPS - APRIL

- 1) Sow hardy annuals outdoors.
- 2) Plant healthy dormant dahlia tubors towards the end of the month.
- 3) Finish planting bare-rooted trees and shrubs.
- 4) Continue to plant gladioli.
- 5) Dead head early bulbs.
- 6) Lightly shear winter heathers as last flowers fade.

With all the good news of improving local "R" rates and the majority of our Congregation having received their first jab, we are excited to reopen on **Sunday 4th April at 10:00 AM** for Easter Sunday worship, led by Rev. Les Gill and including Holy Communion.

Planned services for the rest of April are as follows:

11th - Rev. Martin Ferris 18th - Rev. Richard Eastman 25th - Mr. David Todd

Our decision to reopen is based on the latest data for our area and the government guidance which suggests coronavirus is something that we will have to live with for some time to come. Therefore, we must implement all necessary safety measures but in order to survive, we must reopen.

We must also consider the detrimental effect of Church closure on the mental health of our Congregation, who, without internet access, have been excluded from online worship and the daily devotionals and weekly services provided by Richard. Their lack of spiritual input can only be resolved by the reopening of the Church.

We are also aware of the decisions made by other local churches of various denominations, who, presented with the same data, in no way feel irresponsible by their decision to have remained open throughout the latest Lockdown, or to reopen by Palm Sunday at the latest.

Whilst not blindly led by their actions, following careful and prayerful consideration, we believe that reopening on Easter Sunday is both desirable and acceptable. We have completed another deep clean of the Church and have checked regularly on the building throughout Lockdown.

Our large, airy building and organ, which draws air from a different room, thus providing a flow of fresh air, gives us the right conditions to reopen.

Of course, no one is forced to attend live worship. This includes both Congregation members and Worship Leaders, who attend at their own discretion. For anyone who does not wish to lead or attend live worship, alternative arrangements will be made.

The Zoom group service on the 14th March was both successful and much appreciated by all of those who attended. We thank Kevin for being Whetstone's representative and for his contribution to the service. Regrettably, given the age demographic of Whetstone's Congregation and the lack of internet access and expertise, most of our Congregation were unable to attend or participate in the Zoom service. However, thanks to Reverend Richard Eastman for Leading Worship and for supplying paper copies of the service so that even those who were unable to attend in person were able to attend in spirit.

We thank Reverend Richard Eastman for all of his services, provided in various formats throughout the Lockdown.

We also thank Di Statham for continuing to produce a group magazine, enabling us all to keep in contact, even though meeting together has been impermissible. We thank Kevin for collecting and producing items for the magazine on the behalf of Whetstone URC and for delivering paper copies to members of the Congregation.

We send Easter blessings to all our friends across the group.








Method:


Cut the soap block into 7 pieces

Add a few drops of oil, quarter teaspoon of powder


Mix and pour into a silicone loaf tin

Age UK Oadby & Wigston

It is with great sadness that we learn of the plans to close Age UK Oadby and Wigston this month.

It all began with Wigston Old People's Welfare Association in 1965. Chairman was the late Curtis Weston, a member of the then Church of Christ in South Wigston. (now the URC) He was a local and County Councillor and a tireless worker for the people of South Wigston. He was replaced in 1970 by Alan Kind a member at South Wigston Methodist Church.

The Association became Age Concern in 1971. Through Alan Kind, a Contact Centre for the elderly was started at the South Wigston Methodist church in 1971, serving drinks and biscuits on Tuesday and Thursday morning. This was staffed by volunteers from the Methodist church and the other churches in South Wigston.

A Saturday luncheon club was also held at the Methodist church, catering for 25 plus men and women each week, again staffed by the ladies of the church on a rota basis, with the men providing the transport. These activities continued until they were transferred to the Basset Centre, where, as well as the coffee mornings, lunches were served during the week.

An office above the Oadby and Wigston Advertiser newspaper on Long Street was leased for 2 hours on a Wednesday afternoon, for the elderly to call in with any problems they had, this was staffed by volunteers. Later a liaison officer was appointed to do this work, this was Age Concern's first paid helper. Paid for with a grant from the local authority.

The dream was for a Centre where people could drop in for tea and coffee every day, and the committee was working hard to achieve this. Several sites had been looked at, and in 1974 a site in Paddock Street was earmarked for the Day Centre.

Fundraising began in earnest with coffee mornings, street collections and some very generous donations. The Local Council made an interest free loan of £12,000. A highlight was the "Buy a Brick" appeal, which was started off by Larry Grayson of TV fame.

Building began in 1977 with Alan Kind as the architect and R C Weston as the builders. Work was completed by December and the volunteers moved in doing internal work.

The Day Centre opened in 1978, the dream had become a reality. There were drinks and snacks, help was available, later lunches were served, and there was a room for hire.

Through Help the Aged the first mini- bus was purchased to bring people into the Centre. Things went from strength to strength and the building was extended in 1981 and has been extended again since then.

The Association became Age UK Oadby and Wigston in 2012. Throughout the years the Association has grown from the first dropin coffee morning centre and expanded to accommodate the needs of the local community in a purpose-built building. Facilities have broadened, and residents have benefited from a restaurant, coffee bar, education, exercise and keep fit, socialising, free information and advice, the shop and many other activities and services.

For many years Wigston Magna URC used the centre for their Spring and Christmas bazaars.

Age UK Oadby and Wigston will be sadly missed by all of those who have used it.

Think Before you Speak


Sometimes we know what we mean to say but the wording does not come out "quite" right. Here are a few notice announcements that could maybe have worded slightly differently:-
